The seasonal slowdown often seen at year end was mostly absent in 2014. Although the number of homes listed for sale decreased, the buyers remained in the game to purchase available inventory.

In Rosedale, one of the biggest changes we saw in 2014 vs 2013 was the number of residential construction projects. In particular there were many tear downs of smaller residential homes and duplexes. These homes were replaced with new and taller duplexes and triplexes. In 2013 there were 7 attached homes sold in Rosedale. In 2014 that number increased to 24.

Night time lighting has proven to be a very good deterrent for mischievous and criminal activities. Please consider lighting your front porch in the evenings, especially as it is still dark during early evening hours when many folks are still walking in our neighborhood.

If you notice a street or alley light that is out or dim, please report the issue to Xcel Energy. Xcel Energy of Colorado installs and maintains all lighting on public streets and alleys in the City of Denver. In the past, they have been very quick to remedy problems. Their telephone hotline is 800-895-4999. If you have difficulty getting Xcel to respond, please contact us.

If your alley doesn't have a light, you can petition the City of Denver to have one installed. Support from at least 75% of the block residents is required to submit the petition. Net proceeds of \$2805.74 were donated to Urban Peak, a local non-profit, serving homeless and at-risk young adults between the ages of 15 and 24.



TAX SEASON SAFETY TIPS

Tax filing day is some months away, but while you're busy gathering all your documents, receipts, and bank records, identity thieves are scheming ways to get your tax refund and steal your identity. January 13th begins Tax Identity Theft Awareness Week. Here are some tips to make your tax season... less taxing.

- 1. FILE EARLY The earlier you file, the more likely you'll get your refund before the fraudsters.
- 2. FILING ONLINE Make sure your internet connection is secure. No going to Starbucks or public Wifi to file. Those connections are not secure, making that coffee shop more than a latte stop.
- 3. DON'T MAIL FROM HOME What's that you say? The flag up on your mailbox is a signal for fraudsters saying: "Hey, all my private tax information is in this envelope including my social security number and bank records. Come and get it!"
- 4. EMAILS FROM IRS Don't believe them! Tax identity thieves may send phoney "phishing" emails or texts. The emails look like they are coming from the IRS, but know this: The IRS doesn't email or text people and will never request personal information over the internet. If the IRS does need to contact you, it will be through the mail. But, just to make sure the request is legitimate, call the IRS directly.
- 5. CHECK YOUR MAILBOX Fraudsters love to beat you to your mailbox. Especially if there may be checks arriving. The best way to keep a fraudster away from your refund check is to request your return be automatically deposited into your bank account.

- 6. CHECK YOUR TAX PREPARER'S QUALIFICATIONS Know who is helping you file. If you are using an outside source to help you file:
- All paid tax preparers must have a Preparer Tax Identification Number (PTIN). In addition, ask if the preparer is affiliated with a professional organization and attends continuing education classes.
- Check the preparer's history with the Better Business Bureau and check for any disciplinary actions and licensure status through the state boards of accountancy for certified public accountants; the state bar associations for attorneys; and the IRS Office of Enrollment for enrolled agents.



THE HOW'S, WHAT'S AND WHY'S OF COMPOSTING

When I said the word 'composting' to my husband, his gut reaction to the word was "a stinky, slimy mess". My own reaction to the idea of composting was a feeling of intimidation. I think these two reactions summarize what many people feel about home composting. It helped me when I realized that composting is, essentially, just recycling. I know how to recycle! So think of composting as recycling taken to the next level. Paper, leaves, coffee grounds and many leftovers can all be recycled, which means less garbage is put into landfill and less methane gas is produced. This reduces pollution (brown cloud) and slows the erosion of the ozone layer. Over 20% of our nation's greenhouse gases come from garbage in landfills. Much of this garbage can be diverted and recycled.

But, do I want that stinky, slimy mess in my backyard? Here is the beautiful part about composting through the city program. Done correctly, it is not a smelly endeavor and it is easy. On Jan 1st, the City rolled out its composting bins to our neighborhood. For a small fee of \$29.25 per quarter, the City provides a container for compost. The City picks it up weekly and delivers the organic material to a composting facility run by

A1 Organics, where it is allowed to go through a natural process that transforms it into usable compost that is then sold to farmers and landscapers. What a great way to help our planet!

Only 3% of our neighborhood is currently signed up for the City composting program. We'd love to see more of our neighborhood involved in composting. I know I am excited to compost, now that I understand it better. For more information on the City program and to sign up, please visit the RHGNA website and click onto the Sustainability Page. WINTER FUN IN DENVER'S PARKS

The Mile High City boasts
more than 4,000 acres of
traditional parks and parkways, and we are lucky to
have one of them in our neighborhood. Stroll
through Harvard Gulch Park during this snowy
season and take in the views of the Rocky
Mountains. Whether you like to snowshoe, cross
country ski, or sled, the park can accommodate

you. Snowball fight, anyone?

But what if there isn't any snow on the ground? Your children can still get their rosy cheeks indoors at the Harvard Gulch Rec Center. Do you know about the MY Denver Card? Thanks to Denver voters' overwhelming support of Measure 2A in 2012, all Denver students ages 5 to 18 now have free, year-round access to the city's 23 recreation centers and 29 pools with the MY Denver Card. The MY Denver Card, sponsored by United Healthcare, will also serve as your child's Denver Public Library card, giving Denver's children the keys to learning and staying active.

Cultural institutions throughout the city have partnered with MY Denver to give youth and their families discounted admission to enjoy and learn more about what makes Denver great. Benefits at the various cultural partners' locations are active during different months of the year but you must re-register. Previously issued MY Denver Cards are no longer active.

In 2015 you can enjoy NEW offerings from cultural institutions throughout the city including Denver Botanic Gardens, Denver Art Museum, Denver Zoo, Museum of Contemporary Art, DCPA, Clyfford Still Museum, History Colorado Center and the Buffalo Bill Museum.

Bring identification, proof of guardianship and residency to your nearest recreation center to receive your child's printed MY Denver Card.
