

DENVER WATER DECLARES STAGE TWO DROUGHT

April's snowstorms along the Front Range and in our mountain watersheds have helped a lot with our dire water supply situation. But this is the second year in a row of below-average snowpack and drier-than-normal conditions in our watersheds. Denver Water's reservoirs haven't been full since July 2011, and reservoir levels are still well below normal. This isn't Use Only What You Need. This is drought. This is Use Even Less. A stage two drought is effective April 1, which means customers may water no more than two days a week, and must follow a set schedule. These rules are mandatory. In a drought, we need to save as much water as possible, so the fines are higher than in normal years. For full details, please visit http://www.denverwater.org/Drought/.

Are you wondering when to plant flowers, vegetables? With spring arriving here in Denver, you might be tempted to go ahead and plant your warm season vegetables. On average, the rule of thumb is to wait until Memorial Day to plant in case there is a late freeze.

Evans Bridge Construction insight and update

The Evans bridge over Santa Fe Boulevard has been under repair for months. There are two reasons for this. One is that the bridge has been in need of structural repairs and the other is due to a larger growth plan for the area. The work on the bridge is part of Denver's Community Planning and Development for the *Evans Station Area Plan*. The plan was adopted October 12, 2009 and calls for the expansion and widening of the bridge to facilitate pedestrian use. This plan is called Transit Oriented Development (TOD) and affects everything within a half mile of the light rail station. The TOD plan is designed to provide greater access and improve the area around the light rail station. Improvements include providing affordable living, parks, retail shops and pedestrian friendly sidewalks and crosswalks on Delaware Street and at the intersection of Evans and Broadway. The work on the bridge is scheduled to be completed by the end of June or early July. However, expect to see construction and improvements along the south Broadway corridor for some time. Improvements to look for as part of the TOD plan include multi-story residential buildings west of Broadway at the intersection of Cherokee and Asbury, drainage improvements west of Logan at Rosedale Park and pedestrian bridges over Santa Fe at Jewell and Iliff. Silence of the Bees - How can you help the bees?


In the winter of 2006, a strange phenomenon fell upon honeybee hives across the country. Without a trace, millions of bees vanished from their hives. A precious pollinator of fruits and vegetables, the disappearing bees left billions of dollars of crops at risk and threatened our food supply. The epidemic set researchers scrambling to discover why honeybees were dying in record numbers — and to stop the epidemic in its tracks before it spread further. While researchers probe into understanding colony collapse disorder, and beekeepers work hard to improve bee health, ordinary citizens can help the honeybee too.

Become a Backyard Beekeeper Today, there are half as many beekeepers as there were two decades ago, but backyard beekeepers can strengthen the bee gene pool by adding

healthy local bees to the mix. Experts recommend starting with a local beekeepers' association* to learn about keeping bees alive and healthy. It's important that bees are adapted to the local climate, so you'll want to start with a local source for bees. Just two hives can pollinate an entire mid-sized residential garden. You might find yourself with a lifelong hobby - for some, beekeeping grows into a passion. *Denver Beekeepers Assoc. www.denverbee.org

Get Closer to Nature Keeping a backyard bee garden is another good deed you can do for the honeybees. With rapid urban development limiting their foraging habitat, backyard gardens can offer a supply of nectar and pollen. Cultivate plants that will attract bees - choose flowers that bloom successively over the spring, summer, and fall seasons such as coreopsis, Russian sage, or germander, to provide pollen and nectar in all seasons. Check with a local garden center for their advice on "bee-friendly" florals. To improve bee visitation, the garden should contain large patches of like flowers planted in close proximity to one another. Diversity is a key factor - researchers find that more bees are drawn to gardens with ten or more species of attractive plants.



Remember: bees don't discriminate between weeds and cultivated flowers, so let those dandelions grow.

Keep your bee garden free of pesticides — a danger in any garden. Some pesticides can kill the bee before it returns to the hive; other pesticides get carried back and can harm the rest of the hive. If you're still not seeing bees in your garden, it's not a wasted effort. Growing a pesticide-free garden is also good for you if you're growing fruits and vegetables. Buying pesticide-free foods at the market also protects humans and bees from pesticide poisons.

Give the Bees a Voice Write to your representatives on the federal level and the state level to support funding of honeybee research. The news focus on colony collapse disorder makes it an ideal time to put pressure on politicians to reinstate laws that used to prevent importing bees into the country and transporting them across state borders. Any effort you make to help bees or increase awareness is a step towards healthy bees, healthy crops, and consequently, healthy humans.
