
Our Neighborhood

Block Captains Needed Great neighborhoods don't happen by accident. Our local neighborhood association (RHGNA) works hard to help make our neighborhood better all the time and we could use your help. RHGNA board members interface with the city government, communicate important news to area residents via newsletters – both emailed and printed - and host regular neighborhood meetings for area residents.

You can help RHGNA board members and your neighbors by becoming a Block Captain. It's an easy task, but it's a big help to our organization and our neighborhood. A block captain's primary function is to distribute the quarterly newsletter to the few residents on his or her assigned block who don't receive them by e-mail. That takes just a few minutes every quarter. And once or twice a year you'll be asked to circulate flyers announcing special neighborhood events like our annual picnic or important meetings.

It's time to give some of our existing Block Captains a little help. Some have been doing this for years. So please think about pitching in. We can't reach all of our neighbors without you. Rosedale Park Beautification Project

Denver Parks employees are passionate about making our parks beautiful, safe, and enjoyable. Our Rosedale neighborhood is a beneficiary of an employee's commitment to beautify our park.

Tim DeShong, a local artist and Parks employee, was asked if he would help remove a large concrete block adjacent to a path in Rosedale Park. After spending a considerable time and effort, it was apparent that a trailer and lift were required to remove the concrete eyesore. Instead, Tim transformed it into functional art.

Tim's idea was to create a grass-filled park bench, something he calls Urban Natural Art. "Creating a grass bench is an idea I have had for a while, and we didn't need any new materials." He partnered with a few enthusiastic team members and a horticulturist to re-purpose dirt, native plants, mulch and surplus stones to create this urban oasis.

Now, instead of seeing a concrete blemish in an otherwise pristine park, we have native flowers and stone steps leading up to the top of a knoll. It's great to see Parks employees using their creativity and passion to beautify the Rosedale neighborhood!

Connect with the Denver City Council

Denver City Council makes laws, budgets City money, and has authority to investigate City agencies and employees. The Denver City Council has 13 members, 11 from equally populated districts and two elected at large. Our district # 6 is represented by Paul Kashmann. The full Council meets most Mondays in regular session at 5:30 p.m. at the City Council Chambers in the City and County Building. Council committees also meet frequently to discuss and prepare proposed laws. HISTORIC COLORADO STATE CHILDREN'S HOME, INC.

The Colorado State Children's Home housed orphaned children, from infancy to age 18, during the years 1896 to 1971. The orphanage was located in Denver at South Logan Street and East Iliff Avenue on a 54 acre tract of land that was owned by the State Government. Throughout its 75 years of operation, 17,000 boys and girls came to call this institution home.

In 1999, an alumni association was created and named Historic Colorado State Children's Home, Inc. This group, consisting of an 8 member board, represents the many who lived or grew up at this orphanage.

A few of the original buildings remain standing on the grounds of what is now known as Harvard Gulch Park. A long term alumni association goal is to convert one of the existing original buildings into a museum that will tell the stories of the orphanage era and specifically, The Colorado State Children's Home.

SustainAbility Announces Grand Opening of the first Hard-To-Recycle (H2R) Center in the Denver Metro area



DENVER, CO – SustainAbility, an all inclusive recycling services provider, celebrated this summer the grand opening of its second public recycling drop-off center located at 1270 S. Bannock in Denver. The new site employs a total of thirty-one individuals, twenty-five of which have developmental/intellectual disabilities. SustainAbility is a recycling company that combines a passion for the environment and recycling with an understanding that every human being is unique and

has gifts and talents to offer our communities and our planet.

The facility is the first Hard-To-Recycle (H2R) Center in the Denver area acting as a one-stop-drop for residents and businesses. The center accepts traditional recyclable materials such as paper, plastic, metal and glass but also takes a wide range of non-traditional materials (see list, at right).

SustainAbility accepts items that other recyclers cannot take such as fire extinguishers, Styrofoam, bubble wrap, wine corks, CD's, vegetable oil, books, paint, bikes, clothing and much more. Using exclusively e-Stewards certified recycling partners SustainAbility accepts electronics and appliances, which are ethically and sustainably demanufactured and recycled.

Founded in 2010, SustainAbility offers two public drop-off sites in Denver and Arvada and performs residential and commercial recycling pick-up services.

A majority of SustainAbiliy's workforce is comprised of individuals who have developmental/intellectual disabilities; a segment of our society that struggles with an over 70% unemployment rate in Colorado.

The company has grown to employ over 140 individuals and is saving millions of pounds of materials from landfills.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE EMERALD ASH BORER (EAB)

In Colorado, EAB was detected for the first time in September 2013 in Boulder. As a non-native insect, EAB has no native predators to keep populations in check, and threatens all true ash species (Fraxinus spp.). As a result, the beetle poses a serious threat to Colorado's urban forests, where ash trees comprise about 15 to 20 percent of all trees; the Denver Metro area alone has an estimated 1.45 million ash trees. Green and white ash, including 'Autumn Purple' ash and other varietals, have been widely planted in Colorado due to their fast growth, ability to tolerate urban growing conditions and high aesthetic value. Many of the state's ash trees are located on private property and in parks and other community areas.

The Emerald Ash Borer Response Team has a great website to address issues concerning our urban canopy and the ash borer problem we face - visit

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
